Tribute to Ben Morrow; An unsung Hero, A Friend.

Australia lost one of its most formidable and passionate conservationists when we said goodbye to Ben Morrow in July. Ben Morrow, 34, died after a long and arduous battle with terminal bowel cancer. Ben was a friend to many in Australia's forest movement from Newcastle in NSW to Tasmania.

Ben was a man who had a connection to the earth that many people in this world miss out on. Ben was a long term forest activist who always had a wise word and compassion for his fellow blockaders, the wildlife he was standing up in defence of and even the loggers he met when in the forest.

Ben was a brave and strong defender of Tasmania's ancient forests and spent most of his last years living in the threatened forests, from the Styx, to the Weld to the Upper Florentine Valleys. He was a talented climber and rigged many a tree sit for defenders to take a final stand on the frontline. Ben's involvement in the threatened tall eucalyptus forests of the Styx Valley and an action shutting down the woodchip mill in Triabunna in Tasmania resulted in his inclusion in the Gunns 20 lawsuit in 2004. Gunns Ltd, Tasmania's billion dollar wood chipping company was suing Ben along with 20 other defendants, for standing up for Tasmania's wild forests.



Ben made history with his brave effort to sit for twelve hours in Australia's first ever bridge sit. In 2007, the sit was set up over the wild Weld River in Tasmania's south to halt logging of steep old growth forest.

Ben Morrow started his early days of forest activism in the NSW forests of the mid north coast. One of the stories that has surfaced is of an early Chitchester action when Ben was set up in a tripod above logging machinery. It wasn't long before one of the logging contractors showed up wanting to express his frustration by taking an axe to one of the tripod legs that Ben was mounted in. Other contractors showed up and started pegging rocks at Ben. Ben wasn't budging and wasn't fazed..... an early sign of his renowned calm and conviction.

Ben Morrow's efforts have directly contributed to the protection of thousands of hectares of precious native forests from logging; an achievement that will outlast all of us and serve as a permanent memorial to his belief in being able to make a difference.

His big heart, wide smile and unwavering belief in what is right has earned him the love and admiration of a diverse community who now consider him a brother. We are wiser for having known him and mourn his passing. Ben will be dearly missed, well remembered and his contributions never forgotten.

In Ben's own words:

We will always be together, in the forest. We will always be together, in the forest.

Forest Updates & Round Up of Recent Media

While forest activists participated in actions recently in the Weld Valley, logging contractors informed them that they had seen pygmy possums and spotted tailed quolls in the coupe known as WR15F, while they were logging!!! Also these forest activists are witnessing the huge stockpiling of logs on the coupe landings, as log trucks are not transporting logs to the woodchip mill for the next two weeks as these mills are closed. And whilst forest activists were climbing trees the other day, they witnessed gliders flying through the trees of the threatened forest they were in. It's been some sad days in the Weld....

Conservationists halt Logging in Tasmania's World Heritage Value Forest

"Conservationists have today halted logging in World Heritage Value forest in the Weld Valley. Two conservationists have this morning attached themselves to logging machinery, in ancient forest where people were evicted from a protest camp two weeks ago," Huon Valley Environment Centre's Jenny Weber said.

"Logging in these ancient forests adjacent to the World Heritage boundary is a global tragedy. State and Federal Governments are ignoring recommendations by International bodies and concerns of the community and destroying a globally significant ecosystem. We are calling for an immediate moratorium in high conservation value forests and asking the Governments to address an environmentally and economically beneficial future for Tasmania by protecting these forests," Jenny Weber said.

"Tasmania's World Heritage Area needs to be extended as recognised by international experts to include these magnificent and irreplaceable forests. Instead they are being treated with contempt, wildlife habitat is decimated and the trees are sent to the woodchip mill," Jenny Weber said.

Local beekeeper arrested as Weld Valley logging stand by conservationist continues

"A conservationist was arrested in the Weld Valley today, after being attached to a logging machine in threatened World Heritage Value forest that is currently being logged. A second conservationist remains in the forest attached to a logging machine tonight," Huon Valley Environment Centre's Jenny Weber said.

The conservationist arrested today is a local beekeeper, and Leatherwood honey producer, Tristan Lucas of Longley said: "I took the action today to oppose the continued destruction of Leatherwood-rich forests in southern Tasmania. These are a precious resource for all beekeepers, as around 70% of Tasmania's total honey production comes from Leatherwood. However this resource is rapidly diminishing in its distribution as a result of logging operations."

Local Beekeeper barred from forest as Tasmania's leatherwood forest destruction continues

"Local Beekeeper, Tristan Lucas of Longley was arrested 21st May in logging coupe WR015F in the Weld Valley. Lucas will appear in Hobart Magistrates court today to contest bail conditions. Bail Conditions bar him from entering state forest," Environment Centre's Jenny Weber said.

"I will be contesting my bail conditions in order to be able to continue my work. These bail conditions stop me from working and accessing my bee hives, as my hives are in State Forest in the Arve Valley," Beekeeper Tristan Lucas said.

"Forestry Tasmania must urgently change its management of leatherwood resources. It is wasteful and dismissive of the honey industry, and other sectors that rely upon it," Tristan Lucas said.

"Logging of priceless leatherwood rich forest continues across the Southern Forests every day. In the coupe where I was arrested, in the South Weld World Heritage Value Forests, ancient leatherwood trees are being felled every day. This wasteful practice must be stopped immediately," Tristan Lucas said.

Weld Valley faces new logging onslaught, Conservationists return to defend ancient forests

"Conservationists have today staged a non violent direct action in the Weld Valley, Southern Tasmania. A conservationist is perched on a tripod, and two others have attached themselves to the structure. This action has been taken to halt logging in two ancient forest areas," Huon Valley Environment Centre's spokesperson Jenny Weber said.

"A fresh logging onslaught against wild forests is being carried out in the Weld Valley with seven forest areas being logged. Around two hundred hectares is currently being destroyed after approximately 12km of new logging roads have been built in the Weld Valley over the past few months.

Despite logging in ancient forests being a criminal act in this global climate emergency, Tasmania's and Australia's Labor Governments continue to sanction the loss of valuable ecosystems such as those in the Weld Valley," said Ms Weber.

Tasmania's Legal System gives Suspended Sentence to Peaceful Forest Conservationist

"Today in Hobart court, a non violent forest defender, Adrian King, was given a one month suspended jail sentence for his protest taken at Gunns Triabunna Woodchip mill," Huon Valley Environment Centre's Jenny Weber said.



"The Court appears to be acting on behalf of Gunns Ltd in this instance," Jenny Weber said.

"These sort of harsh sentences are usually reserved for people who are a threat to the community. Conservationist, Adrian King has acted non violently and stood up for Tasmania's wild forests for the benefit of all the community," Jenny Weber said.

Two Conservationists Arrested In Tasmania's Weld Valley Protest

"Two Conservationists were arrested in threatened forests of the Weld Valley yesterday. The two conservationists were attached to machinery and atop a tripod for ten hours, and were arrested at 2pm," Huon Valley Environment Centre's Jenny Weber said.

"Conservationists participated in a non violent direct action in the Weld Valley to halt the logging of two forest areas. These threatened forest areas are ancient ecosystems, one of these areas is adjacent to the Tasmanian World Heritage Area. Logging in these areas is a travesty in a time when climate change is a global emergency," Jenny Weber said.

"Huon Valley Environment Centre is calling for the immediate end to all logging in the Weld Valley, and real action taken to protect ancient forests for future generations. Logging of these wild forests is currently at an alarming rate with seven logging operations in the valley. Wildlife habitat of the Wedge tailed Eagle, Spotted Tail Quoll and the Pygmy Possums are vanishing," Jenny Weber said.

Tasmania's Logging onslaught in Weld Valley Halted

"Today, 20 conservationists have established protest structures on all logging access routes to the Weld Valley, southern Tasmania. In a call for an urgent need to protect all of Tasmania's high conservation value forests, conservationists have erected two tree sits and a tripod. The current onslaught of logging in the Weld Valley's threatened forests is wildlife habitat destruction, contributing to climate change and the tragic loss of a large area of wild forests," Huon Valley Environment Centre's Jenny Weber said.

"Conservationists have set up non violent forest defence structures on three logging access routes. The threatened wild forests of the Weld Valley have come under enormous pressure of late with seven areas of forest being logged, including forest adjacent to the World Heritage Area, forest on the banks of the Huon River and large tracts of old growth forest," Jenny Weber said.

Conservationist Arrested in Weld Valley Protest

Tasmania's Logging Onslaught halted for one day

"A conservationist was arrested late today after a day long protest in Tasmania's southern forests of the Weld Valley. Conservationists today halted logging in the Weld Valley by setting up non violent forest defence structures on the three major access routes in to the valley. Today's action comes after new pressure has mounted in the Weld Valley with seven new logging areas," Huon Valley Environment Centre's Jenny Weber said.

"Conservationists are calling for an immediate protection of native forests in the Weld Valley, large scale industrial logging contributes to climate change and wildlife habitat loss. The Bartlett Government needs to take real action to provide a exit package for the industry for those people logging these forests," Jenny Weber said.



WELD ECHO 2009

Gunns 20 Update

Huon Valley Environment Centre remains a defendant in the Gunns 20 case. A trial date has been set for February 2010. In Melbourne's Supreme Court, the trial will commence on 2 February 2010 and has an estimated duration of 20 days. The trial will be heard by a judge, Justice Jack Forrest.

The remaining defendants are Brian Dimmick, Neil Funnell, Louise Morris, Lew Geraghty and Adam Burling. In a separate case, Dr Frank Nicklason also remains a defendant.

The case has already cost an estimated \$3 million and is likely to cost much more by the end. It is already considered the longest running and most expensive case of its kind in Australia's legal history.

Ultramilitance

No other activists in human history have had to face the challenges we face today. The task ahead of us is enormous for the very foundations on which we base our whole lives on, the fabric of the planet, is under threat. Species extinction is peaking with claims we are entering the sixth and largest mass extinction period of the earth's history. A report this year by IUCN, shows nearly one third of amphibians, more than one in eight birds and nearly a quarter of mammals are threatened with extinction mostly from habitat destruction.

Human induced global warming is now a fact, no reputable scientific body in the world disputes this, and the more information that emerges the grimmer the situation appears. In 2005 former NASA chief scientist, Dr. James Hansen warned that: "We are on the precipice of climate system tipping points beyond which there is no redemption." In 2009 , we now have information from modeling at the US based Massachusetts Institute of Technology that shows that without rapid and massive action, the problem will be about twice as severe as previously estimated six years ago. MIT predicted that global temperatures could rise by 5.4 degrees by 2100, which would put many island nations underwater and create hundreds of millions of climate refugees globally. Again Dr Hansen has said that with species extinction, the current evidence of increased polar cap melting and new modeling showing larger temperature increases, that all the factors for " a global cataclysm, are assembled."

For most of us this news is not surprising. In 1996, some 1500 scientists, Nobel laureates from 69 countries warned humanity of species extinction, the threat from climate change as well as population pressures, soil erosion and water scarcity. Their call added to the decade long struggle by environmentalists, to bring these issues to mainstream attention. Yet our society continues to face inaction from governments as well as open hostility to any change from those corporations and individuals who would rather continue the flow of money from these Earth destroying practices than see any change.

Our situation requires a new ethic, a new militancy, to confront the Earth abusers and to turn around our situation for all the earth's creatures and for future generations. If we acknowledge the above problems then it becomes our duty to respond in any non-violent way we can.

Individuals in the past have banded together and have created great change, now we need the largest environmental campaign we have ever seen. It needs to be one that is based on non-violence and staunch no compromise. Compromise has been available to other activists but we have gone past any potential for weakening our response to this environmental emergency. Compromise has failed, the small steps towards incremental change have meant nothing to the animals and the climate, as we still face the worst crisis our planet has ever seen. If we are not prepared to stay strong and speak for the Earth now, then we condemn generations of humans and animals to bleak and uncertain future.

We need a new community of warriors, like the mythical Buddhist Shambhala warriors who combine fearlessness with gentleness. Women and men who act selflessly, to defend the Earth. A new definition of warrior needs to be forged, not one of violence for greed or

power but one for peace. Using non-violence and acting on behalf of all of the Earth's creatures. Each one of us can take on that role, we are all part of this wonderful fabric of nature, and it calls to us for help. All we need to do is listen and to understand what role we can perform in service of nature and ourselves.

As the crisis gets worse the response from governments and corporations will grow more hostile to change. Already we are seeing proposals both here and in the UK to bring in special legislation to protect the big polluters like the coal industry from non-violent protests. Large fines and long gaol terms are being proposed for those who dare challenge climate destroying coal fired power. More police and state resources are being put into monitoring and harassing activists. In the US we have seen the rise of the Green Scare campaign, with authorities targeting environmental activists under terrorist legislation, allowing them to give long sentences and maximum security detention. As the situation gets worse and the protests escalate there will be some of us gaoled as the result of our non-violent actions. There will be potential violence against us by the vigilantes of industry. We need to stand together in solidarity with all our fellow activists. An attack on one of us whether by the State through the justice system or by violence from individuals is an attack on all of us, our rights and the Earth's rights.

As a movement we need to help those people persecuted, to offer them support in any way we can. Of course not everyone is able to be directly involved, some of us need to stay back from the frontline and perform a number of other important roles for change. Joanna Macy talks about the Turning Point we are facing and the three main roles to transform society. They are: The direct actions to slow the destruction, the creation of new green alternatives to our current economy and the shift in human consciousness to become more aware of our connection to the Earth. We all have different talents and different life circumstances so each of us needs to access where we can fit best. The key for success will be a broad and abundant community challenging the destruction. In all our actions we must constantly assess our effectiveness and reaffirm our commitment to non-violence. For again the wrong actions can drain us and divert us from the real cause at hand. The Earth's enemies are ready to pounce on our mistakes or to smear us at any chance. We are not alone; there are many people out there across the world creating positive change. From the global Transition Town movement, Rising Tide activists, permaculturists, deep ecologists to Forest activists standing in the way of chainsaws, we are all challenging the forces that are destroying the planet. Each of us forms a small part of the web that is being spun to protect the Earth. We do not choose the time we are alive, but we can choose our response to the situation we find ourselves in.

As individuals we also must care for ourselves and our fellow activists. The struggle for humanity's survival and for the creatures that share our ecosystem, may be a long one. It may go beyond our own lives. The greed and ignorance of those who continue to poison us and our Earth will not be halted easily. They will not relinquish their power and positions easily and will fight any challenge with an army of resources they have plundered from our Earth. In this planetary emergency, if we are all to survive, we must seek the beauty and positive sides of our lives and nurture them, even in this time of crisis there is still wonder and love in the world. We should continue to be inspired by the grandeur of the wild forests, the clean flowing streams, the deep blue ocean and the diversity of life on this glorious home of ours. All of us must look at our core selves and check that our lives are balanced with personal nurturing, political action and a connection with nature. Once we have that balance we act from a grounded, centred position and we can truly be the best warriors we can be for the earth.

Forest news from abroad...

RI may lose natural forest by 2015, says enviro expert

Indonesia may lose its status as the world's third-largest forest nation by 2015 as the country's natural forests are likely to disappear due to deforestation and lax efforts to replant logged forest areas.

Rinekso Soekmadi, a forestry expert from the Bogor Institute of Agriculture (IPB) said the government should take tough action to force forest concession holders (HPH) to replant logged forest areas. "Otherwise, all natural forests will be lost by 2015. This is the worst case scenario based on current rates of deforestation," he said.

The government has allocated 64 million hectares of natural forests, out of the country's 120 million, as forest concession areas that can be legally logged.

Rinekso, IPB's director of international cooperation, said that much of the total 120 million hectares of natural forests, were located in forest concession areas.

"The declining trend of deforestation from 2.8 million hectares in the 1990s to the current level of about 1 million hectares is not due to improved forestry management," he said.

"It is because we don't have enough existing forests anymore."

Rinekso said the government's forestry management gave too many benefits to concession holders as there was no clear policy requiring them to take responsibility for severely depleting the country's forests.

"Many HPH holders then leave concession areas without replanting trees there," he said.

The forests are the natural habitats of wild animals and plants that make Indonesia's biodiversity so rich. Indonesia is world renowned for its biodiversity, with nearly

3,700 species, or 15 percent of the world's total fauna found within the archipelago.

With the severe impact of climate change, calls for forest nations to preserve forests continue to grow in order to prevent the emission of carbon dioxide retained in trees.

The Guinness Book of World Records claims that Indonesia's rate of deforestation is the highest in the world, with the equivalent of three soccer fields cleared every hour.

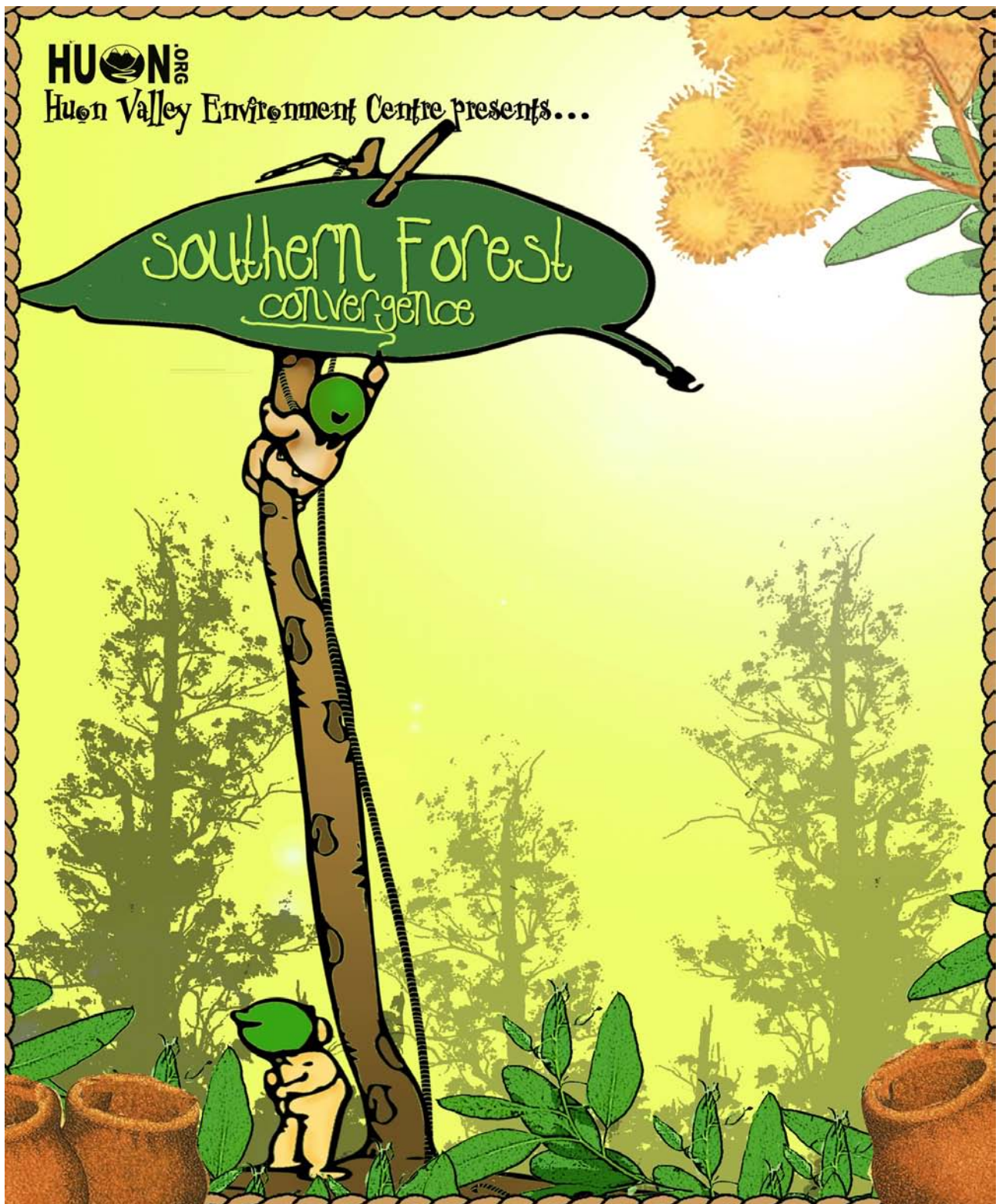
Around 1.8 million hectares of rainforest were cut down in 1997, with figures jumping to 2.8 million hectares per year between 1998 and 2000.

Since then, clearance rates have remained high, at 1.8 million hectares. Executive director of Greenomics Indonesia, Elfian Effendi, said that concession holders should uphold their obligation to replant trees as stipulated in their logging licenses. "If they fail to uphold their business plans to preserve the concession areas they work in, the management of those companies could be sent into jail," he said.

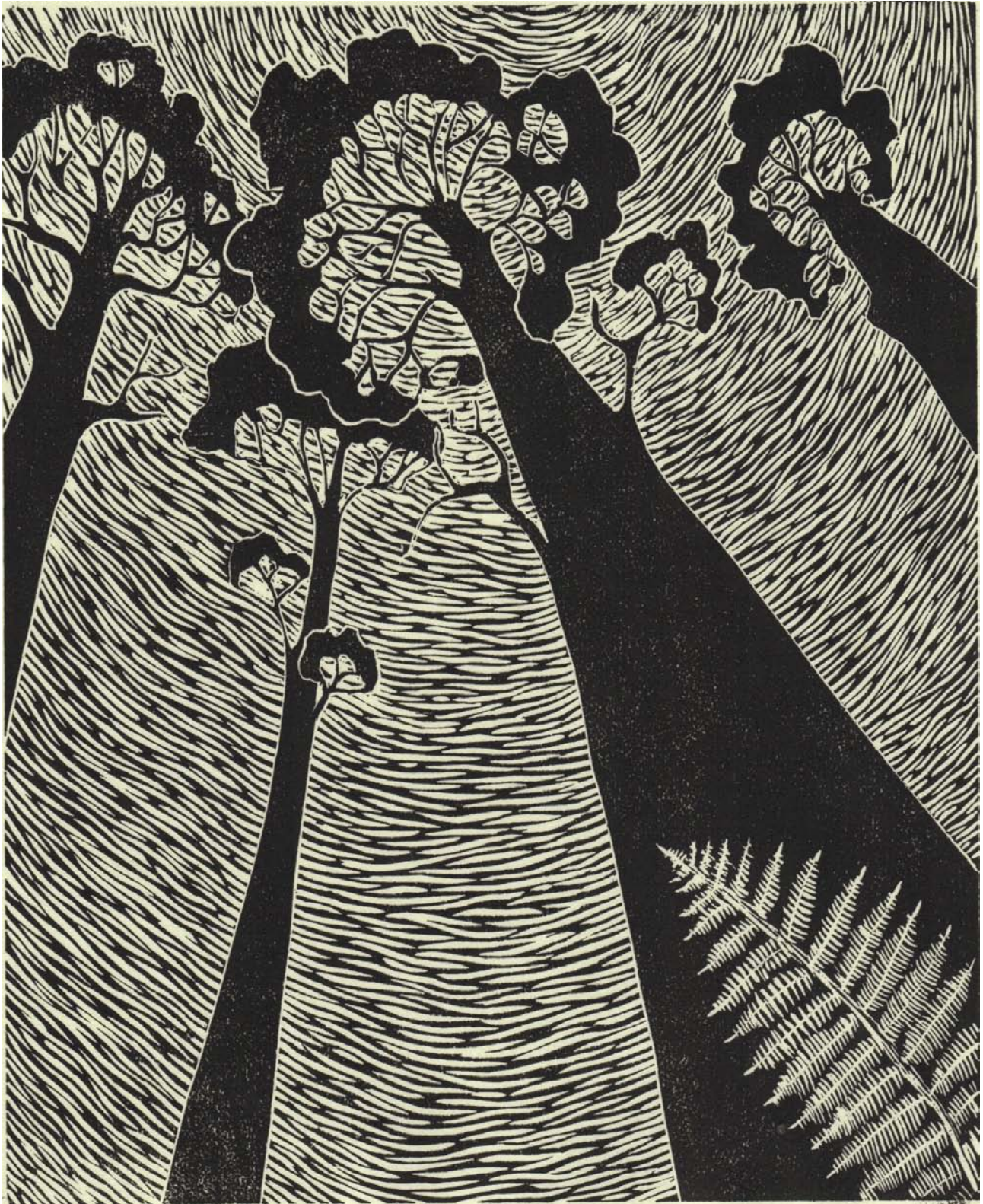
